Aerial Services Now Available in Des Moines

In the spring of 2000, Commonwealth Electric Company of the Midwest in Des Moines, Iowa committed to the investment of a new Aerial Lift

Truck. The truck was added to our fleet after a 2-year period of not having a boom truck of any kind, due to the retirement and red tagging of our 1964 Elliot mounted on its 1982 Chevy chassis. During this period, we had to turn away a lot of service work and rent equipment on a job-to-job basis to meet

our customers needs. We had received a lot of requests for parking lot maintenance, new pole installation, and holiday lighting, so we knew the demand was there. After a long analysis of the numbers, the company made the commitment to purchase the truck.

The Des Moines location does not have a line crew and we hope that this truck and the work it generates will eventually bring us into that market. We are actively marketing our Aerial Services and it has paid off. Not only are we able to further service our existing customers but we are also

> generating new customers by offering the services this truck allows us to perform.

> Our Service manager, Michael Duffy, is heading up the implementation of the new truck under Aerial Services. This truck is working as a specialized service vehicle, taking all the service calls for site lighting work, ballast retrofits, holiday lighting and

Mike Duffy and our electricians working under the Aerial Services job number have done an outstanding job of implementing this truck and making the first year of Aerial Services a profitable one. We are looking forward to expanding our customer base in 2001 and continuing to service our existing customers with this new addition to our fleet.

Power Cell Installation Goes Smoothly

The following is an excerpt from the November 2000 issue of Electrical Contractor.

Gary Demmel, vice president of Commonwealth Electric's Omaha, Neb. office, said that although [First National Bank of Omaha] was his firm's first fuel cell installation, no major problems were encountered. This fact was borne out by William Cratty, president of Sure Power Corporation, Danbury, Conn., the general contractor who reported that fuel cell manufacturer ONSI's equipment guidelines were clear and straightforward. In reviewing the project, Demmel emphasized the critical need for coordination among HDR Engineering, the primary consulting firm; Sure Power, the provider of the entire power system; ONSI, the manufacturer of the fuel cell; Commonwealth Electric, the installer; and First National Bank of Omaha, the customer.

Demmel observed that there is big potential for critical power with high availability, especially for data centers. Contractors, he said, need to be aware of the necessity for these requirements. For actual installation, contractors should review the process well ahead of time. Space was at a premium with the FNBO installation, so most of the conduit and wire layout had to be done in the concrete slab. This took foresight and planning.

OSHA Class Teaches Safe Work Habits

One of the most important parts of an effective safety and health program is management support. It can be difficult for safety directors, project managers and field employees to focus on safety matters if they feel they don't get the support they need and deserve.

As many of you know, OSHA has a program called the OSHA 10 Hour Safety and Health class. This class is designed to give our employees a good overall view of the OSHA safety requirements. This class covers many of the daily obstacles we face and offers guidelines that will help reduce exposure to unnecessary accidents and OSHA fines. Many of you carry the OSHA 10 hour card.

On Saturday, April 7th, I conducted an OSHA class for the Omaha and Lincoln project managers and branch managers. Also in attendance was Dave Firestone, Vice President. The topics covered were the same that you were taught. Having these managers in the class certainly sends a message that management is supportive of all of your safety efforts. I

feel that the class will help managers better understand what is expected of you and also make them aware of the potential exposures you face day in and day out. Many times a project manager will come to your site and not fully understand why we do the things we do. They now know why we test the air in confined spaces, why we wear fall protection, why we purchase the best safety

equipment available and why it is so important that safety rules are followed. I heard many positive comments and I believe this is another big step towards making our company the best there is. Not only do we provide quality service, we also provide well-trained and safe workers, and this includes upper management.



The next time you see your project manager, ask them about your safety. You'll be surprised on the new support you'll receive and how much better they understand your work environment.

Safety is everyone's responsibility. We must all stay informed and work safe.

Orchard Place Child Guidance Center

Commonwealth Electric Company of the Midwest has started renovation work of an existing church in downtown Des Moines. The renovated facility will house the PACE Academy, a division of The Orchard Place Child Guidance Center. Orchard Place offers a vast array of services to at risk youth in the Des Moines area. Highly trained clinical social workers, mental health counselors and psychologists, joined by educators and youth service workers work with residents ranging in age from 5 to 17.

The renovated facility will include classrooms, administrative offices,

gym facilities and conference areas. The electrical portion of the renovation includes new power distribution, new lighting, new branch circuit wiring for lighting and power, new fire alarm system, new telephone and data cabling and equipment and new mechanical systems. The general contractor on the project is Neumann Brothers Construction Company. This is a nice project for the Des Moines location and we are happy to be involved with a project that will mean so much to the at risk kids of the Des Moines area.



New Younkers Store Nears Completion

The Younkers project in Muskegon, Michigan consists of the construction of a new 106,000 square foot retail anchor store for Saks Incorporated. Younkers will be one of several anchor retailers of the new "Mall of the Lakes" in Muskegon. This project broke ground in July of 2000 and the store is scheduled to be open in August of 2001. The Muskegon project is an electrical design build consisting of service equipment, power distribution, lighting, emergency generator, phone and data cabling, fiber optic cabling and loss prevention systems.

Our relationship with Saks has grown over the years and is one of our most valued professional relationships here in Des Moines. Over the last two years, we have completed major renovations and new store construction projects for Saks Inc. in Milwaukee, WI; Chicago, IL; Brainerd, MN; Great Falls, MT; Minneapolis, MN; and Wilmar, MN. Bob Scheer is the Project General Foreman and Stacy Markel is the project Foreman learning the ins and outs of Saks retail construction. We have partnered with The ME Group to provide our drafting services and engineering supervision. We have teamed with a local NECA contractor for our labor force. These types of out of town projects present a unique set of problems but Bob and Stacy are doing a great job. The project looks to be done on schedule and within budget.
