Commonwealth Partners with Scottish Rite to Provide New Fire Alarm System

When Scottish Rite Park, a modern 13-story retirement residence located in Des Moines, had a need to enhance the safety of their residents, they chose Commonwealth Communications as a partner to accommodate their need. Scottish Rite Park provides a quality living facility, with many amenities to enhance the active lifestyle of its residents and should the need arise, a medical wing that provides medical and memory care.

Once Dan Boor, Scottish Rite Park President/CEO/Administrator and Jim Putney, Scottish Rite Park Facilities Manager determined that the safety of the residents could be enhanced with a voice evacuation fire alarm system, they began their quest to find a potential partner. During the process of seeking a potential partner in accommodating their fire alarm system need, Dan was looking for more than just a fire alarm contractor. If you are

observant, when you enter the Scottish Rite lobby, it does not take long to see that Dan and his team have established an environment where the Scottish Rite Park residents and staff are treated and interacted with as members of one large family. When Dan became aware that Commonwealth Communications considers customers not just as a onetime business relationship, but instead values each customer as life-long partners, it convinced Dan to look no further. Dan convinced the Scottish Rite Board of Directors that the staff and residents would be better served by partnering with Commonwealth Communications, rather than pursuing a competitive bidding process.

Another significant consideration that factored into the Scottish Rite Park team in choosing Commonwealth Communications as a partner was the installation partnership of Commonwealth Communications and Simplex Fire Alarm Systems. It had been understood by the Commonwealth Communications team that the Scottish Rite Park project was a perfect facility to introduce the new Simplex TrueAlert ES addressable speakers as a means of providing enhanced safety. This new technology allows for targeted audio messaging so that specific speakers can be selected to provide an evacuation or mass-notification message, to provide appliance self-testing and by design, can reduce cable and labor costs.

Currently, the design for this 10-month project is progressing through the approval process and should begin in late August of 2017. Leading the Commonwealth field installation team will be David Treager, a technician with superior skills and knowledge in the fire alarm, access control and security industry. David's professional demeanor and ability to interact with the residences of Scottish Rite Park make him the perfect fit to lead the field team.

Commonwealth Electric's Omaha office recently had the opportunity to participate in the 2017 Habitat for Humanity Omaha Builders Blitz as part of the Kiewit Building Group team. Each year Habitat for Humanity Omaha partners with several local general contractors to build new houses and renovates existing homes to provide modest and affordable housing for those in need. Families who partner with Habitat Omaha are required to attend homeownership workshops and complete up to 350 hours of sweat equity by helping on the build site or at Omaha's Habitat ReStore.

While acquiring the properties, coordinating utilities, and pouring the foundations for the new homes is a long process, the majority of the construction of the homes happens in just ten days. Commonwealth's first crew was on site June 6th and the presentation of the home to the family took place on June 17th. Johnston Community School District Revamps Old High **School with New Remodel Project**

On June 6th, the Des Moines Low Voltage Department began remodel work at the new Johnston Middle School, formerly the Johnston High School.

Currently. CECM technicians have taken down over 200 paging speakers, audio video speakers, cameras, wireless access points, and classroom projectors. They have removed the antiquated analog camera cabling and replaced it with a new Panduit/General Cable Cat 6 cabling solution. Work yet to complete includes adding cable TV locations to the classrooms and pulling new Cat 6 cables for wireless access points throughout the school.

After the paint and new ceiling grid is installed, CECM technicians will have the daunting task of reinstalling all the devices they had previously taken down. Once all the equipment is in place, our technicians will test and focus the speakers and projectors in the newly remodeled classrooms and hallways.

Typically, this would be a normal everyday cabling installation. Unfortunately, the timeline has been accelerated immensely and must be finished by August 11th, 2017.

This project marks Commonwealth's first experience working with Johnston Schools I.T. Department. They have stated that they are more than impressed with the quality of work they are seeing from CECM's technicians, even considering the condensed schedule CECM is working under.

This project has been an all hands-on deck with nearly every CECM technician being on-site at some point. The field has been led by Travis Briggs with the help of Austin Pruitt, Evan Garr, Joe Schaff, Lindsay Leslie, Will Tucker, Andrew Fitzlaff, Jake Belcher and a few others.

When we asked Travis Briggs, our low voltage foreman on this project, what he thought of the tight schedule, he replied "No hill for a climber" and proceeded to climb up the ladder to pull more cable.

Even with a tight deadline. CECM is determined and motivated to meet their completion date and deliver a quality product everyone can be proud of. As always, we are "Committed to Excellence".
